Most people assume that the government has remained race-neutral in the corporate affairs of its citizens, and that any discrimination—past and present—has come from private individuals, banks and corporations. Guest speaker, John Borders, a local attorney who serves on the board of the Louisville Urban League, was surprised to learn that this is far from reality. Working alongside private business, the government—all branches, local, state and federal—actively and purposefully removed wealth and opportunity from generations of Black citizens. Join John to learn more about this untold part of American history, and what we can do to begin addressing it today.

We will also be joined by educator and poet, Synthia Shelby, who will share her poetic perspective as a black woman in the wake of Attorney General Dan Cameron's investigation.

November 22nd—"Gathering Together While Apart" - Rev. Kathy Hurt and Barb Friedland, DLFE

Thanksgiving may be our most traditional holiday, the one with the deepest and most lasting family traditions, from what food is served to who says grace to how much football viewing happens. But in a pandemic, how is it possible to keep those traditions? And what new traditions may be unfolding for us? Join us as we gather around a table to lead a service for all ages featuring music, stories, and more.

November 29th—"Grow the Circle Wider: A Life Saving Faith" - Jill Sampson or—"What Covid Bubbles and Beloved Community have in common.".

If indeed, ours is a life saving faith, we owe it to the world to throw our doors open and grow our faith circle wider. But we can't do that if we hold tight to old ways, cling to our identities and frame our community as an extended family. What would it look like if we designed our churches for Beloved Community, Justice Filled Relationships and Radical Welcome?



Interim Reflections

All the news now seems to be about the upcoming election, and a frequent description of the election calls it "apocalyptic." The term generally means momentous, but more specifically means the end of the world, and more specifically still the world ending that is part of many spiritual visions. Again and again through human history, we have read the signs and determined the world was nearing its end, or had prophets and visionaries come with this message. Sometimes a specific date is even provided for the cataclysm.

Given that history, one might conclude that the world is extraordinarily resilient, since it has not yet ended, or that we humans repeatedly reach a point where our creative energies are so exhausted that all we can imagine for tomorrow is the end of everything. We keep expecting the world to end—and then it doesn't.

But I wonder sometimes if perhaps a world ending might be exactly what is needed, not a literal blowup of our planet but a thorough, unmitigated, absolute wiping of the slate, throwing out pretty much everything, so that we might rebuild from scratch. It does seem many days that we are in dire need of a new world, as the pandemic continues unabated, fires burn and extreme weather brings devastation, all while leaders posture and blame somebody else. There appears not much around worth hanging onto, at least in its present form.

Whatever the election results, however, they are unlikely to stop the world from spinning on its axis, prevent the sun from rising again, topple everything around us. Perhaps, though, if we greeted the election results, whatever they are, as if they had indeed ended a world that was not working especially well, and as if a whole new response was called for from us, then we could go ahead and set off from an ended world to one that was beginning, that would give us another chance to get it right.

Board Notes - November 2020

Welcome to November's edition of Board Notes. While we were very busy in October, I think that you might already know much of what follows, that is, if you've been reading the weekly emails and if you attended the Fall Congregational meeting.

- Our **Fall Congregational meeting** was held on Sunday October 18. We accomplished a lot! Thanks to all (85!) who participated. Specifically, we:
 - Passed a revised budget that accounts for loss of rental and fundraising income
 - Approved Nominations to the Endowment Board, Stewardship Committee and the Nominating Committee.
 - Learned that our Endowment Fund has surpassed \$500,000
 - Approved Endowment grant proposals
 - Selected six organizations for Share the Plate donations for 2021.
- The Board of Trustees met with Scott Hagan and his team this past month to discuss the proposed apartment complex next to our property. Hagan Properties intends to build 520 rental apartments on the property directly across from Ballard and next to us. We are working on a plan that best meets the needs of TJUC as we consider maintaining the beauty and cleanliness of our back woods. We thank Jon Henney for guiding us through this process.
- The Board declared support for First U's efforts during the protests with the following statement, and our support has been gratefully received at First Unitarian:

We the Board of Trustees of Thomas Jefferson Unitarian Church support and congratulate our sibling congregation, the First Unitarian Church of Louisville, for their recent acts of love and justice. That First Church has offered the sanctuary of their sacred space to the aid of protestors is among the truest manifestations of our faith. This faith firmly upholds the right of individual conscience to shape our society for the better and calls upon us all to confront systemic oppression and white supremacy. So long as recognized leaders in the peaceful struggle for social and racial justice are targeted by law enforcement for arrest, violence, or any other form of abuse, they and their fellow protestors shall find comfort among Unitarian Universalists everywhere. We remain steadfast in our belief that Black Lives Matter, and our congregations will continue to build a world in which every individual, regardless of race, receives justice and is treated equitably and with compassion.

- Name Change process is moving into its final stage which will include at least two rounds of voting one by Survey Monkey (and paper ballots mailed to those not on the internet), and one in a Town Hall. We are shooting for November 15 for the Town Hall final vote, although realize that we may need a little additional time. So please be patient and stay tuned.
 - Our project has been sent to a professional "namer" to generate five names for us to enter into our list of names prior to any voting.
 - We also hope to schedule a Zoom session during which members may make the case for names they truly love.
 - Please continue to keep an open mind!

Welcoming Day of Observance – November 20

Transgender Day of Remembrance

One of the 5 Practices of TJUC's Welcoming Congregation – *Renewal,* is that we recognize and celebrate what are referred to as Welcoming Days of Observance. These days are important to LGBTQ communities because they bring visibility and affirmation, after generations of invisibility and erasure.

On NOV 20, we observe the Transgender Day of Remembrance. The Day was started in 1999 by transgender advocate Gwendolyn Ann Smith as a vigil to honor the memory of Rita Hester, a transgender woman who was killed in 1998. Today, Transgender Day of Remembrance seeks to highlight the losses we face due to anti-transgender bigotry and violence.

The need to shine the light on violence aimed at transgender and gender non-conforming people is more critical than ever. The American Medical Assoc. declared in 2019 that there was an **epidemic** of the murder of trans black women. At the 2016 UUA General Assembly, an Action of Immediate Witness was passed that was called "Stop the Hate: Protect and Support our Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming Family." UUs were called upon to take actions needed to improve the life situations and safety of transgender and gender non-conforming persons.

Our Older High School Class choice for a recipient is *PENDING*


Look for our upcoming announcement!


