# Sunday Services

Our worship theme for October is deep listening. In a culture that encourages ever more self-expression, and these days when more and more people are speaking up and speaking out, the times in which we listen deeply, or when others listen deeply to us, may seem ever more scarce. But listening is not simply a matter of hearing the words spoken by another. In October, we consider the different facets of listening, especially as it affects our spiritual journey.

### October 4: "Where the Heart Longs to Go" -- Rev. Kathy Hurt

Sometimes the last person to be listened to is myself: that is, how do I hear what my heart and spirit are saying to me, among the various desires the culture encourages us to have and over the old tapes from our past we all carry?

# October 11: "Angels Unawares" -- Rev. Kathy Hurt

We cannot listen to everybody all the time, so we soon learn to tune out some people whose voices do not matter to us, some communications we have decided in advance we do not want to hear. Who have you stopped listening to, and why? What messages have you stopped listening to, and why? Is it possible you are missing something important in those times you have opted not to listen?

### October 18: "No Continuing City" -- Rev. Kathy Hurt

Unitarian Universalism puts a strong emphasis on individual voices, individual perspectives on truth. Learning to listen within the setting of a spiritual community can thus be difficult if I tend to believe that my own view is what matters most. This service considers the particular kind of listening we do (or do not do) within our congregation.

# October 25th—"The Black Experience"

Features Black artists. The backdrop will be paintings by Sandra Charles, from her "African Warrior Queen" series. The speaker is our own Prof. David Cooper. He is a recently retired JCC professor who has won many awards for excellence in teaching. The music will be provided by Joyce Belt and The Pearls, Kentucky Music Hall of Fame inductees, singing jazz, blues and spirituals. Poetry will be spoken by Makalani Bandele, an Affrilachian Poet, a graduate of Notre Dame, who has received a Master of Divinity from Shaw University.



### **Interim Reflections**

I recently read that a key skill needed in leaders is the ability to give expression to grief. While it may seem counterproductive or that focusing people on what is good and hopeful is more important, the fact is that until I first honor and voice my grief, I cannot move onto consolation and healing.

This skill is woefully absent in many of our leaders presently, especially in terms of acknowledging the myriad griefs that the pandemic has brought. Instead, we hear false reassurances that the worst is over, or promises of a vaccine right around the corner—but

no words that clearly speak to all that has been, continues to be, lost while the pandemic is with us.

Because a church is an organization of people, and because ministry is all about interactions with people, I regularly note the grief of a congregation that is mostly available just online, and has been that way now for months. I hear many of you saying you miss the chance to be in the church building, to exchange hugs with other congregants, to be present for rites of passage like a wedding or a memorial service. Most recently, some lamented our inability to gather physically in the wake of the Breonna Taylor verdict, to collectively grieve for our troubled community.

Yes, to keep trudging along through the pandemic restrictions, we need to have hope, to be able to look towards good things on our horizon. But we also need to grieve, to note the losses small and large each day that we are apart from one another, to honor what we are prevented from having right now. Be hopeful—and take time to grieve.

### **Board Notes - October 2020**

Welcome to October's edition of Board Notes. September was busier than promised, with name change, bylaws and settled minister search front and center within our church, and our city of Louisville's justice issues looming large in our hearts.

- Our Fall Congregational meeting will be held on Sunday October 18 at 1:00 pm by
  Zoom. Issues will include votes on Endowment grant proposals and Share the
  Plate nominations. We will also hold important elections to the Endowment Board, Stewardship
  Committee and the Nominating Committee. This and more! Please note that votes on our new name and
  the new bylaws will occur in special congregational meetings in the near future.
- The Board of Directors met twice this month, trying to get everything accomplished.
  - Jon Henney gave us a report on the proposed apartment complex on the Hagan property that borders our property (thank you Jon!). We plan to meet with the developer within the next month, and will work to create a situation in our neighboring property that we can feel comfortable with.
  - ♦ The Board met with Hope Howell from the Settled Minister Search Team to discuss what would be important to us in a new minister.
  - We continue to collaborate with Rev. Kathy on interim work.
- We are working with Nancy Coombs-Morgan of the Mid-America Regional staff, representatives from our Family Ministry team and Barb Friedland, our Director of Lifespan Education to explore ways to meet the needs of our families during this difficult pandemic time.
- Enclosed Vestibule/foyer. Construction of the covered walkway and the enclosed vestibule in the front of our building will begin in October. We remain \$2,600 short of fully funding this addition to our building through pledges to the project. The Board has submitted a grant proposal to the Endowment fund to cover this relatively small amount, but we would be grateful for any additional contributions (the request to Endowment will be reduced accordingly). Thanks much!
- The Name Change team will hold at least a couple of brainstorming sessions this month to come up with a large list of diverse and creative names to enter the pool of names that we will vote on. Additionally, we are enlisting a professional "namer" to generate five names for us to enter in our pool. We will schedule a series of votes once we have a diverse set of names from which to choose. Please continue to keep an open mind!



### **LGBTQ History Month is October 2020**

**LGBTQ History Month** is an annual month-long observance of lesbian, gay, <u>bisexual</u> and <u>transgender</u> history, and the history of the <u>gay rights</u> and related <u>civil rights</u> movements. It was founded in 1994 by Missouri high-school history teacher Rodney Wilson. LGBTQ History Month provides role models, builds community, and represents a civil rights statement about the contributions of the LGBTQ+ community. [3] As of 2020, LGBTQ History Month is a month-long celebration that is specific to Hungary, the United States, the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, Brazil, Greenland, and the city of Berlin.

In the United States, Canada, and Australia, it is celebrated in October to coincide with National Coming Out Day on 11 October and to commemorate the first and second marches on Washington in 1979 and 1987 for LGBT rights. TJUC has been a Welcoming Congregation since 2000, when we began the work to make sure LGBTQ people were full members of our faith community. Now is the time for us to embark on a journey that the UUA calls Welcoming Congregation *Renewal*, where we recommit our efforts toward the work of living into the Welcome that we boldly proclaim. We will also learn about current successes and challenges in achieving LGBTQ justice and equity, and how to work toward achieving it.

The MUUC Board of Directors is composed of seven members serving three-year terms.

**Camp Unistar** is a beautiful island retreat in Cass Lake, Minnesota where you can unplug, unwind, and enjoy nature with a village of old and new friends who are largely rooted in Unitarian Universalist values. It is governed by an independent Board of 8 members, with one member appointed each year by the Board of Trustees. All board members must have attended Camp Unistar.

# The New Normal: Faith Engagement at Home

We are living in unusual times. Just six months ago, we were leaving our homes to go to work, to go to school, and to go to church. Thanks to the pandemic, we are now setting up special areas in our homes where we work and have school lessons. And there is the racial justice struggle happening across the nation and in our city, which adds to our sense of overwhelm and concern.

Our church, like so many others, has moved beyond the walls of the building and into our homes. This may seem like yet another expectation of those in parenting roles and yet, there is a huge benefit to families who can find ways that they can bring our faith tradition into daily life. There may never have been a more important time to make that effort. That benefit is in the deepening of relationships.

The Rev. Dr. David Anderson named five principles of what is commonly called faith formation that identify the relational nature of the church. These principles help us see the work of church beyond congregational activities.

- Faith is formed through personal, trusted relationships—often in our own homes.
- The church is a living partnership between the ministry of the congregation and the life of the home.
- Where our principles and intentions are present and practiced, the home is church, too!
- Faith is caught more than it is taught- meaning that it is through experiences that we can grow in our UU faith, regardless of our age.
- If we want ethical and committed children and youth, we need Unitarian Universalist adults who practice our faith with them (especially in the home).

The principles from the Rev. Dr. Anderson move us from thinking programs to thinking relationships. These relationships happen primarily in the home. We are so accustomed to having people come to the church building to explore what it means to BE UU. During these times, people are unable to come to us and so the center of faith experiences has become the home. Here's the good news. Your church is here to partner with you. That is truly the heart of Family Ministry.

Given our new normal, please be encouraged to engage in faith practices in your homes. It can be as simple as lighting a chalice at breakfast or dinner, sharing highs and lows, encouraging young people to ask hard questions, having caring conversations, and listening deeply to each other. Starting this month, specific resources from Soul Matters will be made available to help support this important ministry in your family. Resources and experiences are being made available to support you in a variety of ways, including social media, our website, and the Family Ministry Buzz newsletter.

Please call on me whenever you need a caring, listening ear. I will try my best to be responsive to your needs.

#### SHARING OUR STORIES

### **NANCY NEILL**



Nancy was born in New Jersey and grew up in the Methodist Church. The family of four was not very religious although they followed the 10 commandments and many of the tenants of the Methodist church.

Nancy attended 5 different schools and in different states during her elementary school years. One of the moves was to Nancy's grandmothers' house. Her grandparents were very strict Methodists and there were many rules to follow. They were in church 3 times on Sunday and once on Wednesday. Each morning, the children had a bible reading and a prayer before going to school. She wasn't allowed to see movies, play card games, drink alcoholic beverages, or dance. Sundays were meant for religious services only.

Although her upbringing was strict, Nancy loved to go to church where "everybody knew my name". She was related to many in the congregation.

Nancy didn't question her religious beliefs until college. This was a time when she began observing the behavior of her relatives. One incident that was important in her life was the behavior of a relative who was a "Garden State" farmer. He sought out Puerto Rican migrant workers to work on his farms. He put them up in cinderblock housing, minimally furnished and paid them less than what he paid other workers.

A critical article appeared on the front page of the New York Times about him and his relationship with the migrants. Nancy was struck by this behavior and one Thanksgiving she rebelled by eating alone in the kitchen. She explained to those present why she was protesting.

It wasn't until she had children that she searched for a church where she would be comfortable taking them. This search led Nancy to the Unitarian Church in Michigan.

When her family moved to Louisville, she took the children to the First Church. When the church didn't have childcare available and Nancy was pregnant with her 6<sup>th</sup> child, she moved to Thomas Jefferson. She officially became a member in 1965.

Nancy feels that TJ is the only place that she feels comfortable "being me". Her life has been blessed to have found a spiritual home here.
